

# AN OVERVIEW



When humanity drifted further from God, His pursuit never wavered. He chose a family to carry His promise of redemption to the world, a family through whom the Saviour would come.

Through their lives, we see God pursuing a promised people for Himself by calling them to specific tasks, making covenant promises and working for good in their acts of faith, adversity, and doubts.

At the heart of Israel's story stand Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, the patriarchs. They are the physical and spiritual ancestors of a nation set apart. God walked so closely with them that He became known by their names: the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob.

# ABRAHAM: THE FATHER OF THE PATRIARCHS

God called Abraham to leave behind everything he knew: his homeland, family, comfort, and journey to a land He would reveal. God made a covenant promise with Abraham to give him three things: land, descendants as numerous as the stars and that all nations would be blessed through him. With faith and moments of hesitation, Abraham obeyed. But doubt crept in as he and his wife, Sarah, struggled to have a child. In their impatience, they had a son, Ishmael, through Sarah's servant. Yet God's promise of a Redeemer was not dependent on human effort. Against all odds, Sarah gave birth to Isaac.

#### **ISAAC: THE SON OF PROMISE**

Isaac grew to be a man of faith, even trusting God in one of the most profound tests: when Abraham was asked to sacrifice him. Isaac's willingness to trust revealed deep faith. Later, when Abraham sent a servant to find a wife for Isaac, he trusted God's choice and married Rebekah. God reaffirmed His covenant with Isaac, promising to make his descendants a great nation and bless the world through them.

#### JACOB: THE DECEIVER

Isaac and Rebekah had twin sons, Esau and Jacob. Despite Isaac's preference for Esau, God chose Jacob to carry His promise. Jacob tricked Esau out of his birthright and blessing and fled in fear to his mother's family. In exile, Jacob experienced a transformative encounter with God, wrestling with Him in a crisis of faith. Refusing to let go without a blessing, Jacob was transformed, and God renamed him Israel, marking a new identity as one who wrestles with God.

#### **JOSEPH: THE FAVOURITE**

Jacob's family grew to include 12 sons, but Joseph, his favourite, stirred jealousy among his brothers. Betrayed and sold into slavery, Joseph endured hardship but trusted God. He rose to power in Egypt, saving countless lives during a famine, including his brothers. Joseph's life foreshadowed Jesus: one man through whom God brought rescue and salvation to many.

Through Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, and Joseph, God prepared a family and a nation for the Saviour's arrival. Despite their struggles, His faithfulness never wavered, weaving redemption through ordinary lives to pursue humanity.

Exalted father transforms to Father of many nations (Genesis 17:5)

My princess transforms to The princess (Genesis 17:15)

**JACOB** → **ISRAEL** 

Supplanter transforms to Strives with God (Genesis 32:28)

**JOSEPH** → **ZAPHENATH-PANEAH** 

He will add transforms to God speaks and lives (Genesis 41:45)

Abraham and Isaac lie about their wives being their sisters


#### **JACOB**
